

## Pinkney Jeron Moses, Jr.

Pinkney Jeron Moses, Jr., affectionately known as "Ronnie" to his sisters, died September 29, 2006, at Imperial Health Care in Atlanta, Georgia after a lengthy illness. He was the only son of Pinkney J. Moses, Sr. and Maggie Isabelle Moses Crenshaw, who predeceased him. Born on July 4, 1946, he was 60 years old. He was born and raised in Greensboro and resided there until his illness required that he move to Atlanta to be cared for by his family.

Educated in the public schools of Greensboro, he received his undergraduate degree from North Carolina A & T University and was awarded his law degree from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1975. He became a member of the North Carolina Bar the same year.

Pinkney began his career in Fayetteville, North Carolina as a public defender. After a short time, he returned to Greensboro to join the Office of the District Attorney. This was his last position before beginning private practice with the firm of Martin, Moses and Murphy, which later became Moses, Murphy, and Moses. He ended his career after 20 years of practice when his illness prevented him from continuing to practice. It has been over 10 years since his departure from Greensboro.

Pinkney was married to Edwina Holley Lee and they had one son, Attorney Erik Atiba Moses, who resides in Washington, D.C. He was later married to Attorney Margaret Dudley.

In addition to his son, he is survived by Erik's wife, Mioshi James Moses, and two grandsons, Evan and Ethan; five sisters, Dorothy B. Greason (James), Joyce Moses Williamson, and Irma Jean Moses, all of Atlanta, Georgia; Bernadine M. Duncan (Howard) of Virginia Beach, Virginia, and Carla Hinton of Greensboro; and one uncle, Ramious Crawford of Greensboro. He is also survived by three nieces; Harriett Harris of Atlanta, Georgia; Pier Moses Duncan and Courtney Moss Duncan of Virginia Beach, Virginia; one nephew, Tony T. Harris; one grand niece, Honey Harris Sheats; one grand nephew, John Thomas Harris, all of Atlanta, Georgia; and god-daughter, Lisa Asali Nkonge of Greensboro.

Today, at Shiloh Baptist Church, we gather to honor the memory of this very special person whose life was tragically diminished by an illness both rare and unforgiving. The family's greatest wish is that all who knew him well will remember the smile, intellect, and humor of this man who had a passion for the beauty of the spoken word, an afternoon of fishing, and, above all, the challenges of the practice of law.


